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Proposed 2010-2011 LWVDK Bylaws

ARTICLE I – Name

Section 1. Name. The name of this organization shall be the League of Women Voters of DeKalb County, Inc., hereinafter referred to in these bylaws as LWVDK. This local League is an integral part of the League of Women Voters of the United States (LWVUS), and of the League of Women Voters of Georgia (LWVGA).

ARTICLE II - Purposes and Policy

Section 1. Purposes. The purposes of the LWVDK are to promote political responsibility through informed and active participation in government and to act on selected governmental issues.

Section 2. Political Policy. The League shall not support or oppose any political party or any candidate.

ARTICLE III - Membership

Section 1. Eligibility. Any person who subscribes to the purposes and policy of the League shall be eligible for membership.

Section 2. Types of Membership. The membership of the LWVDK shall be composed of voting members and associate members.

A. Voting Members. U.S. citizens at least 18 years of age who join the LWVDK shall be members of the LWVDK, the LWVGA, and the LWVUS. Those who have been members of the League for 50 years or more shall be honorary life members, excused from the payment of dues if the member so requests in writing.

B. Associate Members. All others who join the League shall be associate members.

ARTICLE IV - Membership Meetings

Section 1. Local Meetings. The LWVDK is organized into the DeKalb County local League to promote the purposes of the League and to take action on local governmental matters.

Section 2. Unit Meetings. Small groups of members of the LWVDK may organize to meet as units to discuss and carry out the League program under direction of the board of directors.

Section 3. General Meetings. General meetings of the entire membership may be held as a means to promote the League program and goals as determined by the board of directors.

Section 4. Annual Meeting. An annual meeting shall be held between April and June at a place determined by the board of directors. The annual meeting shall adopt a local program for the ensuing year, elect officers, directors and members of the nominating committee; adopt budgets as needed; and transact such other business as may properly come before it. Written notice shall be sent to all members at least one month before the date of the annual meeting.

Section 5. Quorum. A quorum shall be any number of voting members present at all membership meetings, provided written or electronic notice was sent to all voting members prior to such meetings.

Section 6. Committee Meetings. Committee meetings are organized to conduct the business of the LWVDK. Committee members may not serve on more than three different committees.

ARTICLE V- Officers

Section 1. Election, Qualifications and Term. The officers of the LWVDK shall be a president, a president-elect, a first vice president of program, a second vice president of membership, a third vice president of fund-raising, secretary, and treasurer. They shall be voting members of the LWVDK and shall be elected by the general membership at the annual meeting and take office at the end of the meeting. All board positions are two-year terms. The secretary and one vice president shall be elected in odd-numbered years. The remaining vice presidents and treasurer shall be elected in even-numbered years.

Section 2. President. The president shall have such powers of supervision and management as customarily pertain to the office; shall preside at all meetings of the organization and the board of directors, or designate another person to do so; shall be, ex officio, a member of all committees except the nominating committee; may, in the absence or disability of the treasurer, sign or endorse checks, drafts, and notes, and shall perform such other duties as the LWVDK board may direct. The president may appoint the chairs of special and ad hoc committees.

Section 3. President-elect. The president-elect shall perform the duties of the president in the absence of the president and shall succeed to the office of the president at the completion of the president's term of service. The president-elect shall assist the president as requested by the president and the board.

Section 4. Vice Presidents. The vice presidents shall perform such duties as the president and the board shall direct. The vice presidents, in the absence of the president and president-elect, shall preside over a board meeting, in order of rank, and shall possess all the powers, and perform all the duties of those offices. If the offices of president and president-elect are vacant, due to resignation or other reason, the vice presidents in order of rank shall preside until such time as the membership shall elect a successor to fill the office of the presidency at the next annual meeting.

Section 5. Secretary. The secretary shall keep minutes of the annual meeting of the LWVDK and of all meetings of the board of directors; shall notify all officers and directors of their election; shall sign, with the president, all contracts and other instruments when so authorized by the board; and shall perform such other functions as may be incident to the office.

Section 6. Treasurer. The treasurer shall collect and receive all moneys due; shall be the custodian of these moneys; shall deposit them in the financial institution designated by the board of directors; and shall disburse the same only upon order of the board; shall present statements to the board at its regular meeting; and submit an annual report to the annual meeting. The treasurer shall also serve as a member of the budget committee.

ARTICLE VI - Board of Directors

Section 1. Selection, Qualifications and Term. The board of directors shall consist of the officers, at least five elected directors, and not more appointed directors than elected directors. All directors shall be voting members of the LWVDK. Directors shall be elected by the general membership at each annual meeting and serve a two-year term until their successors have been qualified and elected. Vacancies other than the presidency may be filled by vote of the remaining members of the board. The term of office of the appointed directors shall be one year, and shall expire at the conclusion of the next annual meeting.

Section 2. Powers and Duties. The board of directors shall have full charge of the property and business of the organization, with full power and authority to manage and conduct same, subject to the instructions of the general membership. It shall plan and direct the work necessary to carry out the program as adopted by the national convention, the state convention, and at the LWVDK annual meeting. The board shall create and designate such special committees as it may deem necessary.

Section 3. Executive Committee. The board of directors may delegate power and authority to an executive committee consisting of the officers. The executive committee may act in person, via teleconference, or via electronic correspondence. The activities of the executive committee shall be documented by the secretary or someone designated by the secretary. The activities of the executive committee shall be reported to the board at its next regular meeting.

Section 4. Meetings. There shall be at least six regular meetings of the board of directors annually. The president may call special meetings of the board of directors and shall call a special meeting upon the written request of four members of the board. The president shall have the authority to schedule a board meeting on an alternative date that is agreeable to a majority of the board members when necessary to achieve quorum. The president is authorized to allow members of the board of directors to attend a board meeting by electronic or telephonic means as necessary and possible.

Section 5. Absences. Four absences of any board member, regardless of reason, shall constitute a resignation from the board of directors.

Section 6. Quorum. A majority of the members of the board shall constitute a quorum. Any one or more members of the board may participate in a meeting by means of conference telephone or similar communications equipment allowing all persons participating in the meeting to hear each other at the same time. Participation by such means shall constitute presence in person at a meeting.

ARTICLE VII - National Convention, State Convention and Council

Section 1. National Convention. The president or delegate elected by the board shall represent the LWVDK at the LWVUS convention. Based upon any additional delegate votes allotted to the LWVDK, the delegates to the LWVUS convention shall be designated by the board.

Section 2. State Convention. The president or delegate elected by the board shall represent the LWVDK at the state convention.

Section 3. State Council. The president or delegate elected by the board shall represent the LWVDK at the state council.

Section 4. Delegates Qualifications. All delegates shall be voting members of the League.

ARTICLE VIII. - Nominations and Elections

Section 1. Nominating Committee. The nominating committee shall consist of five members, of whom three shall not be members of the LWVDK board. The three to be elected at the annual meeting shall include a chair. Nominations for these positions shall be made by the current nominating committee and presented at the annual meeting by the nominating committee chair. Promptly after the annual meeting, the LWVDK board shall appoint two members to the committee who may be current or former members of the LWVDK board. All shall serve a one- year term.

Section 2. Suggestions for Nominations. Suggestions for nominations for officers and directors may be

sent to the nominating committee by any voting member. The report shall be included in the DeKalb Voter.

Section 3. Report of the Nominating Committee. The report of the nominating committee of nominations for officers, directors, and members of the succeeding nominating committee shall be sent to all members at least one month before the date of the annual meeting. The report of the nominating committee shall be presented to the annual meeting. Immediately following the presentation of this report, nominations may be made from the floor by any voting member, providing the consent of the nominee has been obtained.

Section 4. Election. The election shall be by ballot, provided that when there is but one nominee for each office, the secretary may be instructed to cast the ballot for every nominee. A majority of those in attendance qualified to vote and voting shall constitute an election. Absentee or proxy voting shall not be permitted.

Section 5. Election Committee. The president may appoint an election committee to:

- (a) count the votes cast by the membership;
- (b) report the results of the election; and
- (c) certify the results of the election to the secretary.

ARTICLE IX – Program

Section 1. Authorization. The governmental principles adopted by the national convention and supported by the League as a whole constitute the authorization for the adoption of a program.

Section 2. Program. The program of the LWVDK shall consist of those local, state and national governmental issues chosen for concerted study and action.

Section 3. Procedure. The members at the annual meeting shall act upon the program using the following procedures:

- A. **Recommendations from Members.** The board of directors shall consider the recommendations sent in by the voting members at least three months prior to the annual meeting and shall formulate a proposed program.
- B. **Proposals to Members.** The proposed program shall be sent to all members at least one month before the annual meeting.
- C. **Adoption.** A majority vote of voting members present and voting at the annual meeting shall be required for adoption of subjects in the proposed program as presented to the annual meeting by the board of directors.
- D. **Non-Recommended Program.** Recommendations for the program submitted by voting members at least three months prior to the Annual meeting but not recommended by the board of directors may be considered at the annual meeting, provided that:
 - (1) The annual meeting shall order consideration by a majority vote, and
 - (2) The annual meeting shall adopt the item(s) by a two-thirds vote.

Section 4. Changes. Changes in the Program, in the case of altered conditions, may be made provided that:

- (1) Information concerning the proposed changes has been sent to all members at least two weeks prior

- to a general membership meeting at which the change is to be discussed, and
- (2) Final action by the membership is taken at a succeeding meeting.

Section 5. Program Action. Members may act on programs only in conformity with positions taken by the League. Members may act in the name of the League only when authorized to do so by the appropriate board.

ARTICLE X- Financial Administration.

Section 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the LWVDK shall be from July 1 to June 30.

Section 2. Dues.

- A. The LWVDK shall make full per member payment (PMP) to the LWVUS annually.
- B. The amount of annual dues shall be proposed by the board and determined by the members at annual meeting. The board shall also propose categories of membership, including associate member, such as students and honorary lifetime members.
- C. Local dues shall be automatically increased by the amount of increase in state and/or national dues without approval at annual meeting.
- D. Schedule. Dues shall be payable annually on September 1. Dues for new members joining January 1 through May 31 shall be 50% of the applicable annual rate. Full annual dues paid by new members joining June 1 or later shall confer membership until September 1 of the next year.
- E. Payment. Members will be encouraged to pay dues by November 1. Members who have not paid their dues by January 1 shall be considered inactive.

Section 3. Budget. A budget for the ensuing fiscal year shall be submitted by the board of directors to the Annual meeting for adoption. The budget shall provide for the support and operation of the League. The proposed budget shall be sent to all voting members at least one month before the Annual meeting. The budget shall be adopted by a majority vote of the members attending the annual meeting, except that the per member payment shall be approved as provided in Section 2.

Section 4. Budget Committee. A budget committee shall be appointed by the board of directors at least three months prior to the annual meeting to prepare a budget for the ensuing year. The budget committee shall consist of no fewer than five members, including a chair and the treasurer.

Section 5. Audit. There shall be a review of the financial records every two years or whenever there is a change of treasurer.

Section 6. Distribution of Assets on Dissolution. In the event of dissolution of the LWVDK for any cause, all moneys and securities which may at the time be owned or under the control of the LWVDK shall be paid to the LWVGA after the board of directors has paid or made provision for payment of all the liabilities of LWVDK. All other property of whatsoever nature shall be disposed of as the LWVDK board shall, in its absolute discretion decide.

ARTICLE XI - Parliamentary Authority

Section 1. Rules. The rules contained in the most current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order*, those as determined by the LWVDK parliamentarian, and the committee charged with that duty shall govern the organization in all cases in which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with

these bylaws.

Section 2. Clarification. The LWVDK is a part of a larger organization. Where the LWVDK lacks clarification on an issue, the LWVDK will consult the LWVUS bylaws, procedures and policies to clarify the issue.

ARTICLE XII- Amendments

Section 1. Amendments. These bylaws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the voting members at the annual meeting, provided the proposed amendments were submitted to the membership in writing at least one month in advance of the meeting, and informs all members that the bylaws are on file in some specific place and available for inspection.

90 YEARS OF THE LWV: HISTORY OF WOMAN SUFFRAGE Part III (1900 -1916) by *Lenecia Bruce*

In 1900, Susan Anthony, now 80, gave Carrie Catt the presidency of the National Suffrage organization. Over the previous decade, Ms. Catt worked on referendums, made reforms to the movement itself, and created strategic action plans in preparation for national leadership. After 1900 the Republications in Congress were strongly pro suffrage and many of their wives were or had been activists in their home states. In 1912, the Republican Party split, with an off-shoot forming the Progressive Party. The disruption in the Republican Party also spilled over into the Suffrage organization. Jane Adams, one of the Suffrage organization's vice presidents, gave prominent support to the newly formed Progressive Party. Jane Addams, as the most admired and influential woman in America at the time, was one of the 18 women delegates to the Progressive Party's inaugural convention. Ms. Adams also seconded Teddy Roosevelt's nomination as the Progressive Party's presidential candidate. In 1912, women on the political scene were more visible than ever before. They were voting for the first time in California and Washington, and nationally nearly a million women were able to vote. Roosevelt, however, failed to rally the broad progressive coalition he sought. Roosevelt's campaign helped defeat the Republican old guard, but his campaign for President assured a massive Democratic victory. The Democrat-led Congress was dominated by southerners who were traditionally hostile to woman suffrage.

In 1913, Woodrow Wilson, a Democrat, was inaugurated as president. Alice Paul was the head of the Suffrage Association's Congressional Committee at the time. Soon after Wilson's inauguration, Paul arranged for a delegation to seek Wilson's support for the Anthony Suffrage Amendment, as had been done with every president since the 1874 inauguration of Rutherford Hayes. President Wilson received them courteously but he assured them that even suffrage petitions signed by thousands would not influence him. Wilson's eventual conversion came through his association with Louis Brandeis, a progressive Boston lawyer. Through him, Wilson met women who were interested in social justice reform and through them he began to understand women's roles in bringing about social change. Wilson gradually warmed to the suffrage advocates. He sought their views and appeared capable of changing his mind.

As the 1916 elections approached women in 12 states now had at least presidential suffrage. Both presidential nominating conventions were treated to spectacular suffragist parades. Both party platforms endorsed woman suffrage, though not by federal amendment. The brilliant political strategist –Carrie Catt summoned the annual Suffrage Association Convention in September and invited both presidential candidates to Atlantic City to address the assembly. The Republican nominee, Charles Evans Hughes, was campaigning in the West and could not attend. Wilson did! He appeared with his wife, and was accompanied by several pro-suffrage cabinet members and their wives. His speech was a retrospective summary of the evolution of the suffrage movement. He said, "I have come to fight not for you but with you. And in the end I think we shall not quarrel over the method." While stopping short of endorsing a federal suffrage amendment, many date this as his conversion to the suffrage cause. The Suffrage Association's leaders agreed that the federal suffrage amendment would have priority and the campaigns in states would be harmonized with this objective. Woman suffrage was now a major issue with which both parties had to deal. (To be continued.....)
